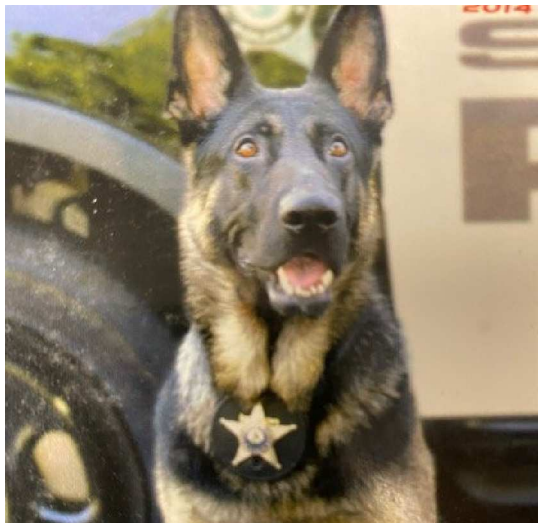

## MESSAGE FROM POLICE CHIEF BILL WOLF

The Schaumburg Police Department is dedicated to providing the very best service to all citizens, and to those who visit the Schaumburg community. We value the partnership we have with our community. We work to identify innovative ways to reduce crime as together we problem solve and prevent crime. Through this partnership, last year the community experienced a nearly 9% drop in Part I crimes, which are the most serious crimes reported and detailed further within this report.



In 2022, one of our most notable accomplishments was the development of our Real Time Information Center - a network of cameras throughout the Woodfield corridor with feeds into a command center at the police department. Along with this large undertaking, we have been planning for the rollout of future initiatives, such as body worn cameras and a drone program. Technology is ever changing and extremely valuable to increase the security of communities and officers alike.

While technology is important, it does not take the place of human interaction. Effective face-to-face communication is vital to successful policing. Of particular concern are the calls involving those experiencing a mental health crisis. Our officers have Critical Intervention Team training, and we have a Human Services Unit. This year we developed plans to expand our resources for handling these call types in 2023, which will be overviewed in the [Future Initiatives](#) section of this report.

We also focused on improving the quality of life for our employees by implementing requested 12-hour hybrid shifts and continued hiring new officers with the aid of a streamlined lateral hiring process.

I am fortunate to be in a position to hear about the great services our officers and department members do every day to help others. I invite you to join us at our many engagement opportunities, follow the Village of Schaumburg's social media accounts, and even reach out to me if there is a topic you'd like to discuss. I look forward to another successful year of partnering with the Schaumburg community.

## 2022 SPOTLIGHT REAL TIME INFORMATION CENTER

The Real-Time Information Center (RTIC) is an initiative made possible by grant funding through Homeland Security's Urban Area Security program. The village was awarded \$494,000 for this center's implementation. The objective was to create a network of cameras in the Woodfield corridor with a live feed available within the Schaumburg Police Department. Officers can access the camera feeds 24/7 in an effort to develop suspect information captured during a crime, assist in an active call for service, conduct surveillance, and thwart observed in-progress crimes. In 2022, 272 calls for service were assisted by RTIC accessibility.

The Woodfield corridor was selected as the focus of this grant due to the large number of people that frequent the area each day and its economic importance to the community and region. Unfortunately, malls are targets for active shooters and other acts of violence and crime. In 2019, Woodfield Mall was targeted by an individual who was charged with terrorism after he drove his vehicle maliciously through the mall's occupied interior structure. No crime is acceptable and this department strives to make visits to the Woodfield corridor as safe as possible.

The RTIC was also a contributing factor to the Village of Schaumburg placing first in a Digital Cities Survey during 2022. The survey ranked communities on several technical fronts not limited to: strategic planning, constituent engagement, transparency, innovation, project management, network infrastructure, network security, and more.

"The addition of the RTIC to our toolbox has been an invaluable resource for our department and community," said Chief Wolf. "It has assisted in numerous investigations and is helping us improve the security of Mall corridor visitors and employees every day. I'm very proud of all who were involved in bringing this highly technical vision into fruition and thank the Village of Schaumburg for supporting our efforts."

# 2022 SPOTLIGHT COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The Schaumburg Police Department strives to engage with the community beyond our calls for service by hosting and attending meetings and events. We also look for innovative ways to interact with the purpose of building community trust while increasing safety. These are just a few of the examples from 2022:

## CITIZENS POLICE ACADEMY

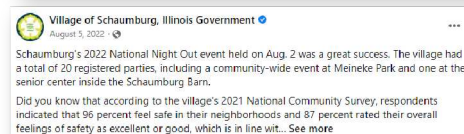
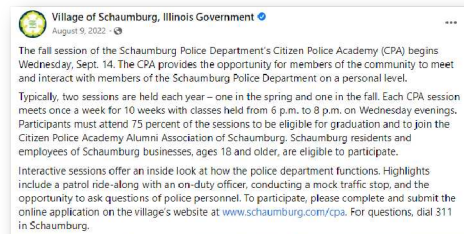
Twice a year, the Crime Prevention Unit prepares a curriculum to bring those in the Schaumburg community into the department for structured classes and learning opportunities. The goal is to cultivate liaisons within the community who have a solid understanding of the police department and what police resources are available. It also helps increase understanding as to how officers respond to calls for service and the challenges they face every day.

## SENIOR SAFETY PRESENTATION

Crime Prevention partnered with the Support Our Senior Council to conduct Senior Safety Presentations dedicated to Personal Safety for Seniors. This was an intense collaboration between many in the community and culminated with "models" from UPS, USPS, FedEx, AT&T, Nicor, ComEd, Cook County Sheriff's Department, and the Schaumburg Police, Fire, Code Enforcement, Engineering & Public Works, and Animals Control Departments. Each model provided a safety tip while showing their uniform. Contributors to planning included Schaumburg Fire, Nursing, Senior Services, Social Services, Kenneth Young and the Schaumburg Bank and Trust. Over the three presentations, a combined total of 220 attended.

## NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The Chief, Deputy Chief, command staff, and other department personnel attended various National Night Out block parties to show the department's commitment to the community's safety. In a concerted effort, the department coordinated 21 community events, with an estimated participation of 2,000 members from those neighborhoods. There were also community parades conducted for four of the five senior living facilities to ensure there was inclusion for convalescent seniors. Additionally, other village personnel participated, including the Village President, several trustees, a Fire & Police Commissioner, and Fire Department members. Support and various resources from the Schaumburg Boomers, Costco, Culvers, Dicks Sporting Goods, and several other businesses helped make the August event successful.

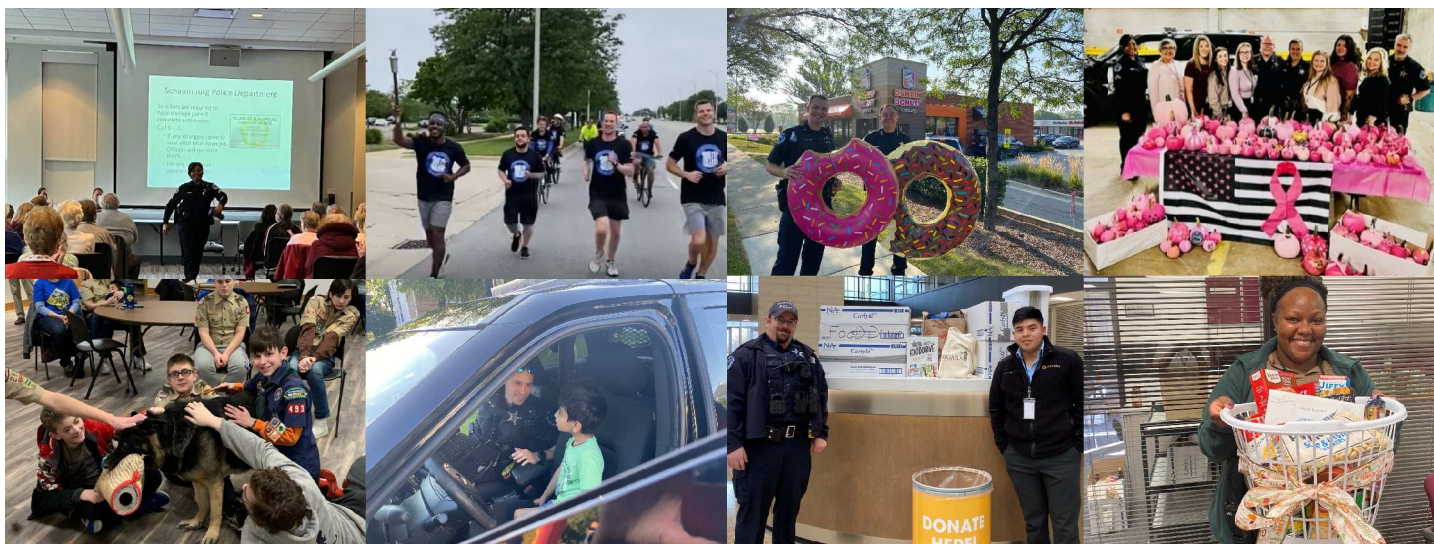

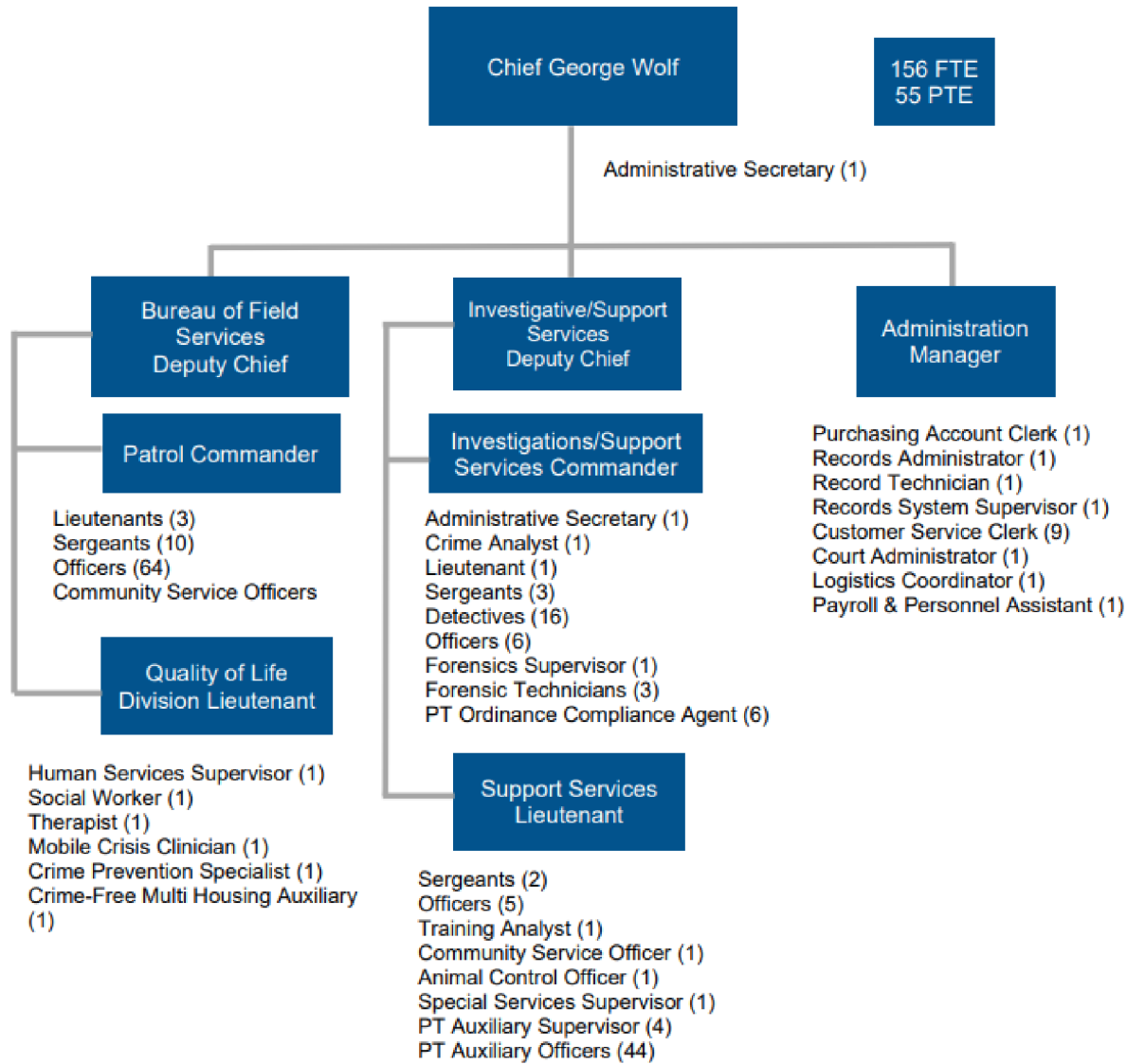

# PUBLIC PORTAL, ACCREDITATION AND BIAS FREE POLICING INFORMATION

Since 1986, the Schaumburg Police Department has been an accredited law enforcement agency through CALEA® (the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies). The department was in fact the first agency in Illinois to become accredited and has continuously commitment to this independent review process. The accreditation process is designed to ensure that a law enforcement agency is adhering to the most contemporary and up to date best practices with regard to policy and procedures. A public portal is available for the public to provide comments regarding an agency's compliance with CALEA standards, engagement in the service community, delivery of public safety services, and overall candidacy for accredited status. These comments can be in the form of commendations or concerns. The overall intent of the accreditation process is to provide the participating agency with information to support continuous improvement, as well as foster the pursuit of professional excellence.

*CALEA® is not an investigatory body and subsequently the public portal should not be used to submit information for such purposes. Additionally, there will be no response other than acknowledgement to submissions; however, the information will be considered in context to its relevancy to compliance with standards and the tenets of CALEA® Accreditation.*

## BIAS FREE POLICING

All persons having contact with members of the Schaumburg Police Department shall be treated in a nonpartisan, fair, equitable, and objective manner, in accordance with the law, and without consideration of their race, color, national origin or other individual characteristics or distinctions as defined by department policy.





# POLICE INCIDENTS

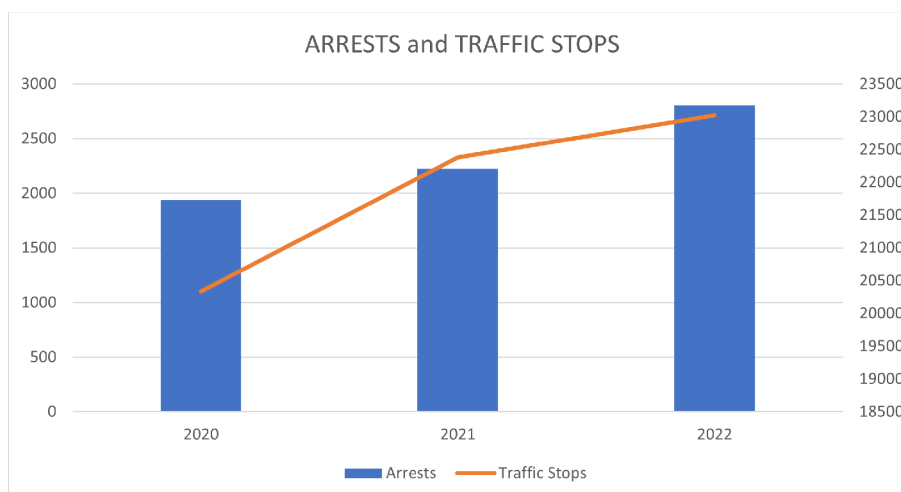
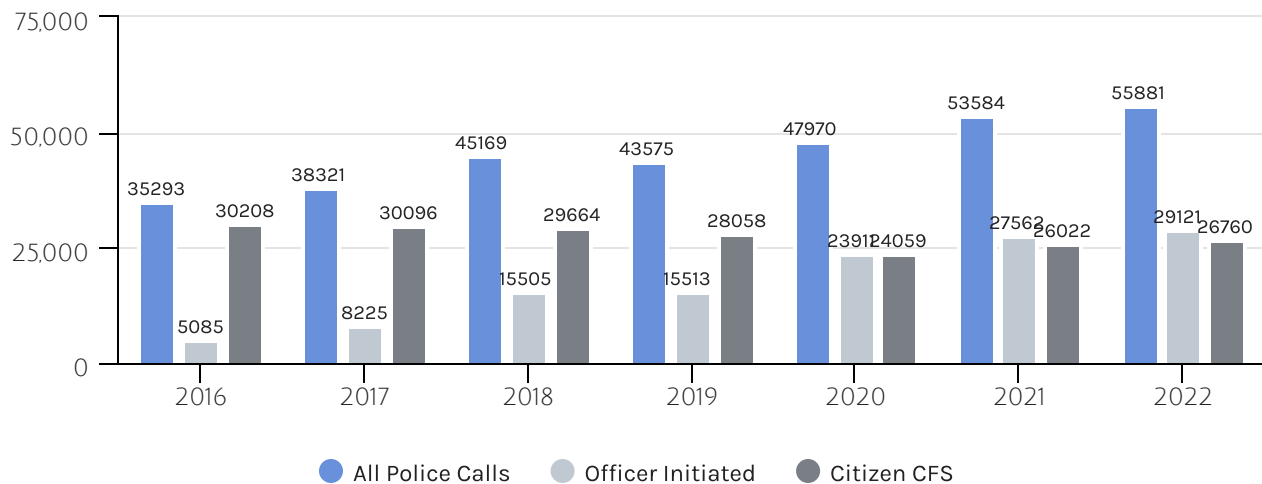
In 2022, incidents increased by 3.4% from 2021. This total reflects a combination of both Officer Initiated and Citizen CFS. The combined 2022 incidents total is also an increase of 27.0% over the 2016-2021 yearly average CFS of 43,985. The recent increases from 2020 - 2022 is a result of activity returning to normal levels following the pandemic.

The difference between these two call types is described below:

**Officer Initiated Incidents** - officers conduct a police activity that is self-directed and does not generate from a citizen calling to request services. In 2022, this category increased 5.3%; from 27,562 in 2021 to 29,121 in 2022. Increase is largely attributed to traffic stops and related arrests.

**Citizen CFS** - citizens call the emergency or non-emergency phone number requesting police services. In 2022, this category increased 2.8% from 2021 and is down -4.5% from the 2016-2021 average of 28,017.

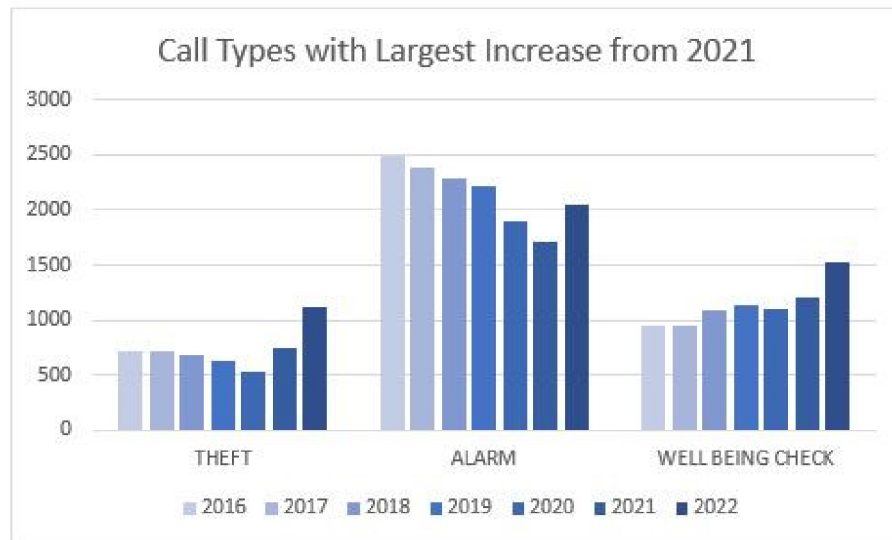

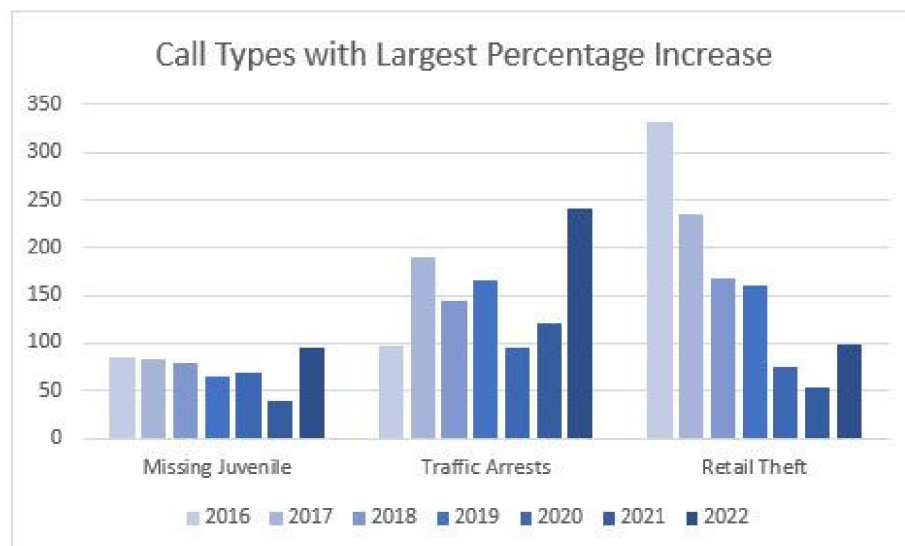
Call types with the largest annual increase by number of calls from 2021 to 2022 were:

- RETAIL THEFT (85%)





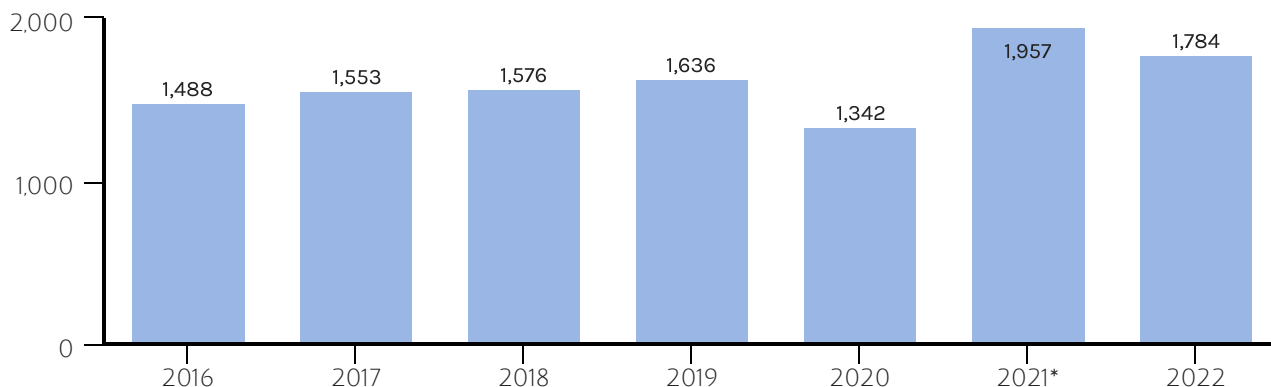
# CRIME STATISTICS

In 2022, Part I crimes, which are the most serious offenses reported, experienced an -8.8% decrease when compared to 2021. Schaumburg experienced no homicides during the year.

\*Vehicle Theft experienced the largest increase with 89 in 2022 compared to 63 in 2021, a rise of 43%. This is on-trend with a report that analyzed [National Insurance Crime Bureau's 2022 data](#) and concluded Illinois experienced the fifth highest rate of vehicle theft in the country last year with an increase of 35% over 2021.

## PART I CRIMES HISTORICAL



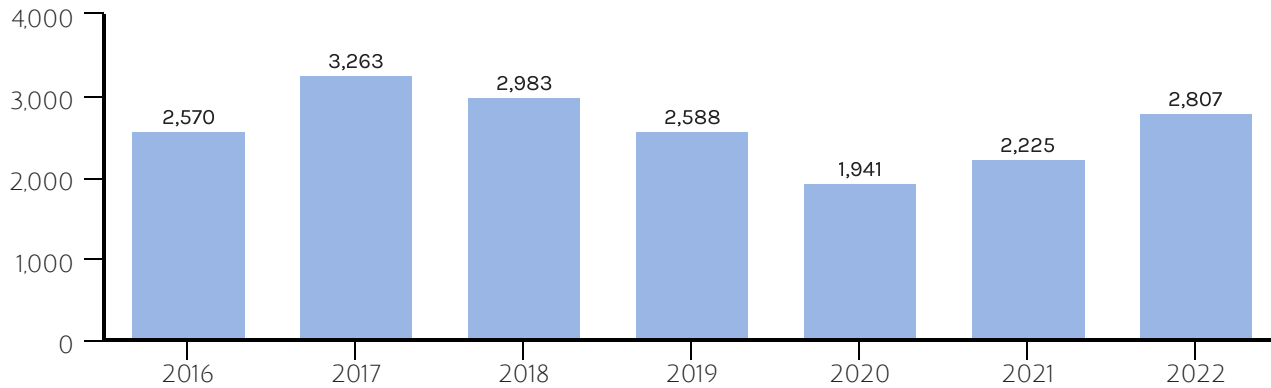
\*As with many other communities in Illinois, in 2021 Schaumburg reported 560 Illinois Department of Employment Security identity thefts, and an additional 265 identity thefts through other means. This contributed to the 45% increase in Thefts in 2021. Theft decreased by -11.3% in 2022; however, Schaumburg followed a nationwide trend wherein catalytic converter thefts experienced an increase. In 2021 there were 191 catalytic converter thefts, and in 2022 there were 401, an increase of 109.9%. # ARRESTS

In 2022, there were 2,807 arrests, an increase of 26.1% over 2021 and 8.1% over the six-year average of 2,595.

# WEAPON OFFENSES

Incidents involving weapons remained infrequent last year, with 29 in total. There were 28 weapons-related arrests; 11 of which were the result of self-initiated activities officers conducted.

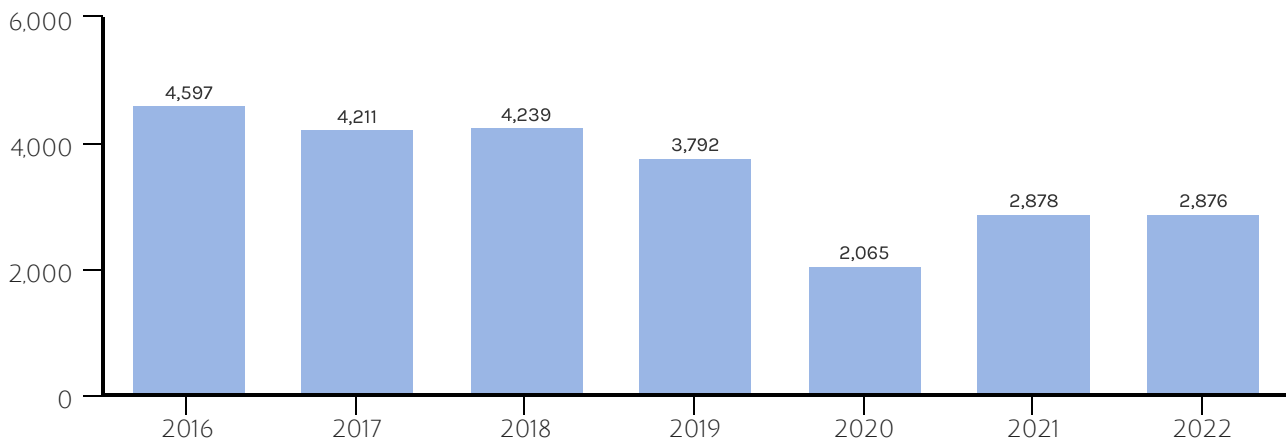


# TRAFFIC CRASHES

Over the past seven years, 2022 experienced the second lowest number of traffic crashes. The only year lower was 2020, during the COVID-19 pandemic. That year crashes dropped -55% from their highest seven-year level in 2016. For 2022, the crash total of 2,876 was very consistent with 2021, with only two fewer crashes.

Schaumburg police participated in several Illinois state-sponsored traffic safety initiatives during the year. Detail officers dedicated shifts specifically to identifying and stopping drivers exhibiting behaviors including distracted driving, as well as impaired and dangerous driving. Spearheaded by our Traffic Unit, these campaigns included "Drop it and Drive", and impaired and dangerous driving campaigns over Super Bowl weekend, St. Patrick's Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and New Years.

## TRAFFIC UNIT

Traffic safety is a relevant issue for residents and visitors alike. Unlike violent crime, which is less common in Schaumburg, traffic crashes occur in the Village daily. The frequency of accidents can be attributed to many factors, most notably, the volume of motor vehicles travelling in and out of the Schaumburg. To reduce crashes, police monitor high volume locations prioritizing areas in which they respond to injury crashes. Throughout the year, police engage in specific enforcement campaigns targeting these areas. Analyses are conducted to determine if there are specific violation types, roadway, traffic configuration or signage improvements that may assist in reducing accidents.

The Traffic Unit's primary goal is to improve traffic safety through both enforcement and education of traffic laws. Members also investigate major crashes that occur and are responsible for managing the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) safety and enforcement initiatives. Through their efforts, the Traffic Unit hopes to reduce traffic collisions, facilitate safe travel, and expedite the flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic. In 2022, along with specialized enforcement details and daily enforcement, the following were noted activities:

- Assisting patrol with responding to calls for service
- Car seat installations
- Community outreach
- Construction zone enforcement
- Roll call trainings for other officers
- School zone enforcement
- Truck enforcement

## COP ON A BUS

Uniformed School Resource Officers partnered with other officers in an operation to identify and cite those violating stop arm laws when students were commuting in occupied buses. If a violator was identified, officers in a following vehicle would stop the vehicle and issue a citation. This unique initiative fulfilled a two-fold goal; keeping students safe, and engaging with children in a different setting.





## TRAINING

The goal of the department's training program is to develop the knowledge and skills of police officers through continued education and training. The department utilizes training opportunities presented outside of the organization, as well as relying on the knowledge and expertise of others inside the organization. As an example, our sergeants each have areas in which they are considered subject-matter experts. It is their responsibility to share that knowledge by training officers. These trainings occur during their shift and across others. In so doing, not only are the officers learning, the sergeants are cultivating their leadership skills. Training topics and goals are identified and monitored throughout the year to ensure all officers are assigned and have completed established requirements.

## AUXILIARY UNIT

Our Auxiliary Unit consists of 44 part-time non-sworn officers that perform a multitude of duties for the police department. Auxiliary officers conduct traffic control, parking enforcement, booking duties, as well as assignments at special events and other community relations functions. Auxiliary officers also conduct valet compliance checks to ensure locations with valet services are following the Village of Schaumburg ordinances.

# PATROL DIVISION

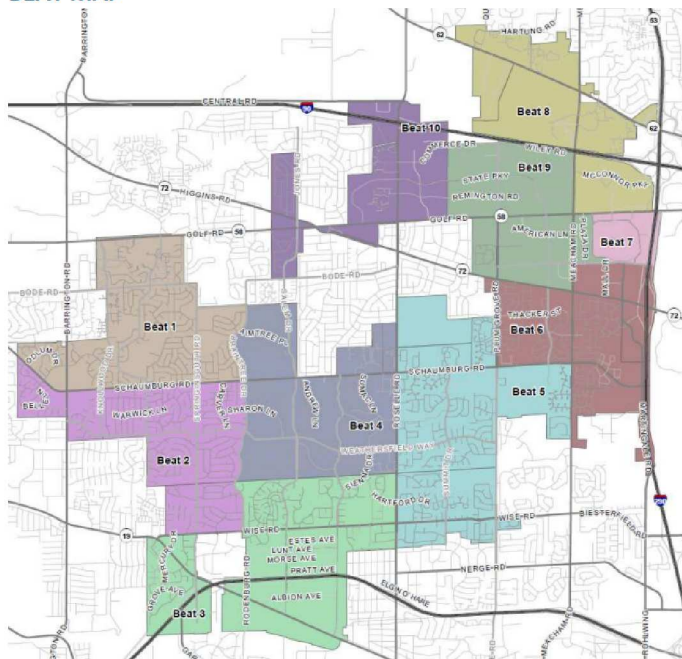
The Village of Schaumburg is composed of ten police beats that are served by 64 patrol officers over three watches and one strategic 12-hour shift. In addition to responding to calls within their beats, patrol officers also proactively engage with residents and businesses in their assigned areas. They conduct community outreach, work with residents to address crime issues, and conduct specialized enforcement as they identify needs in their beats. Some examples of their 2022 activities include, but are not limited to:

- Specialized approaches to illegal parking problems
- Follow up approaches to neighbor disputes
- Reducing calls for service at locations with higher than normal call volume
- Examined reoccurring trespass and panhandling issues
- Addressed traffic safety concerns
- Vehicle and catalytic converter theft initiatives
- Foot patrols
- Liaison for Human Services Unit
- Problem solved noise and nuisance complaints

Patrol officers are often the first to respond to subjects experiencing an overdose. As such, officers are equipped with Naxalone (Narcan) in an effort to reduce fatalities during an overdose. In 2022, Narcan was deployed 18 times, up 63.6% from a total of 11 in 2021.

**BEAT MAP**



In 1996, as part of the transition to community policing, permanent beat and shift assignments were created. All officers select a shift and beat for the entire calendar year. The beat team concept was also developed. Each of the patrol field sergeants (one per beat) is responsible for an entire beat as the beat coordinator. The rest of the team includes three patrol officers and three relief officers.



# INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

After a call for service has cleared and more investigation is required, the case is often assigned to the Investigations Division. These cases can vary in complexity.

Detectives develop leads, conduct follow ups, interview witnesses, victims and suspects, with the ultimate goal of resolving cases for victims and society.

With the addition of one detective this year, a total of four School Resource Officers are now assigned to Schaumburg middle and high schools. They partner with District 54 personnel to ensure the safety of students and staff within school grounds.

In 2022, investigators effected 129 arrests, issued 82 citations and referred 61 cases to other agencies.

## CATALYTIC CONVERTER TASK FORCE

In 2022 the Criminal Investigations Division created a Catalytic Converter Task Force. The task force meets with participating law enforcement agencies and businesses, conducts analyses and develops investigative leads and operations to identify suspects who engage in this criminal activity in the Village and surrounding areas.

## COMMUNITY CATALYTIC CONVERTER THEFT PREVENTION EVENT

This year the department partnered for its second event with Jiffy Lube, where the business spray painted the catalytic converters of high risk vehicles. Mitsubishi Outlander Sport, Toyota Prius, Nissan NV200, Honda Element and Hyundai Santa Fe owners were encouraged to attend, where they were also provided with free Theft Prevention vehicle window stickers. Over 200 vehicles participated.





# SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION

The Support Services Division is a proactive policing unit that addresses crimes that have identified patterns. They also focus enforcement and engagement efforts at the hotels within the Village with the goal of reducing criminal activity. In 2022 they conducted the following activities:

- Compliance checks at various massage establishments
- 284 self-initiated hotel checks
- Drug investigations
- Human trafficking and prostitution investigations
- Saturation patrols
- Special investigations
- Underage tobacco sales
- Weapon investigations

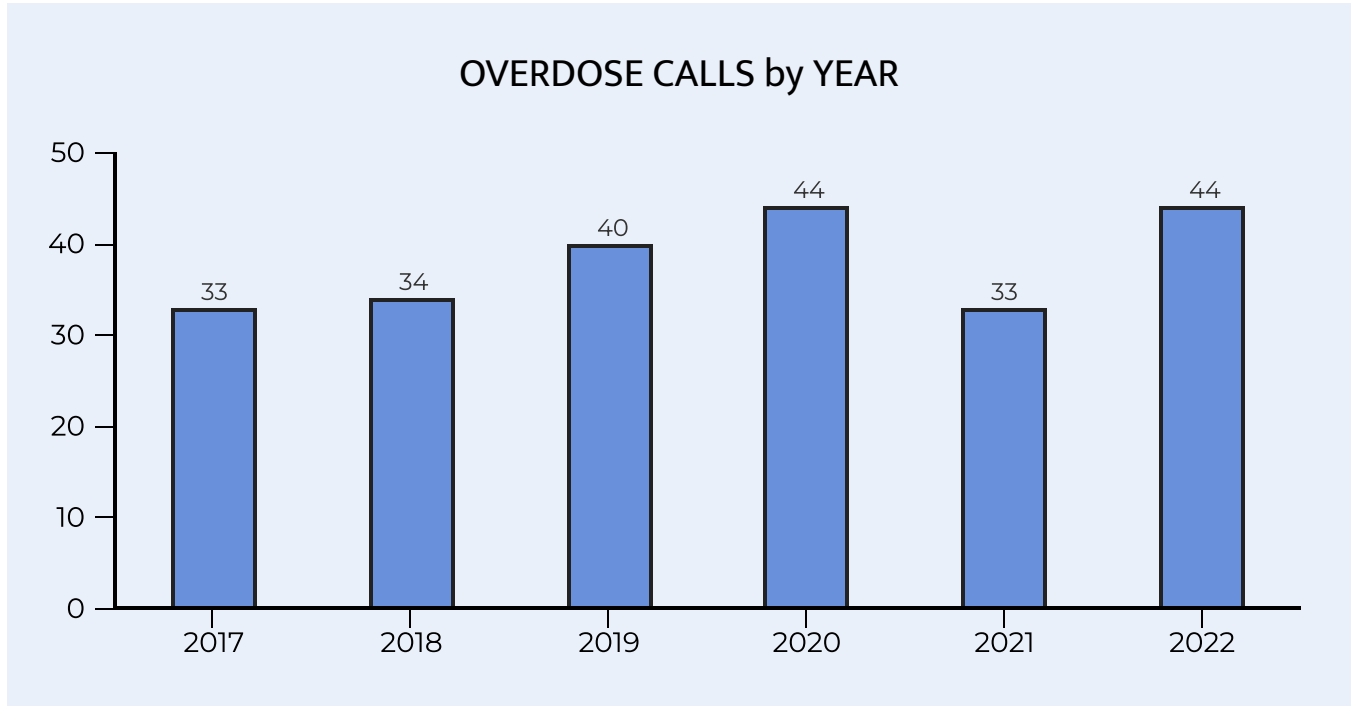

## SCHAUMBURG POLICE RECEIVES FIREARM ENFORCEMENT GRANT

In the fall of 2022, the department was one of 32 local Illinois agencies awarded grant funding to help prevent firearms from being in the possession of those who pose a significant threat to themselves or others. The funding is used to conduct enforcement operations involving individuals who have had their Firearm Owner Identification Card revoked or suspended. Additionally, it provides for special details wherein officers can focus on individuals who have become the subject of a Firearm Restraining Order, Clear and Present Danger notification, or have received a criminal conviction which prohibits a person from possessing firearms. Funding for the enforcement grant, which continues through June, 2023, is derived from the State Police Revocation Enforcement Fund and was made possible through Public Act 102-0237.

# NARCAN DEPLOYMENTS

Schaumburg Police Officers have been trained and equipped with NARCAN to counteract the effects of narcotic overdoses since 2014.

Last year, officers deployed NARCAN in 18 instances, with 16 lives saved.



# COMMUNITY ENRICHMENT UNIT

Community Enrichment Unit bridges the gap between the department and the community in an effort to reduce or remove the opportunity for crime. Community Enrichment Unit personnel strive to identify and anticipate high-risk areas within the Village and develop plans or programs to reduce or eliminate such situations. The identification, anticipation, and development of such plans are accomplished through the use of crime analysis. This unit's goal is to increase public awareness by establishing and implementing community relations programs for the community and for the department. # FUTURE INITIATIVES

During the year, several initiatives have been identified for 2023 to continue raising our standards of service to the Schaumburg community:

## BODY WORN CAMERAS



The department will be implementing the use of body worn cameras in 2023. This is important technology that video captures the police officer's interaction during their calls. It offers a source of truth during encounters and is becoming an expectation in court proceedings. Providing cameras also protects officers from false claims of wrongdoing and allows opportunities to showcase the positive work officers perform on a daily basis.

## DRONE PROGRAM



Drone technology is an asset to police investigations, such as searching for missing and endangered subjects, crash scene documentation and reconstruction, crime scene videos, just to name a few. The implementation of this program includes the purchase of two enterprise level drones, training and certification for five drone pilots, and the associated maintenance and software required to support the equipment.

## MOBILE MENTAL HEALTH UNIT



Late 2022, grant funding for a mobile mental health unit in the amount of \$340,000 was obtained through Representative Krishnamoorthi's office and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. This will be a one-year pilot project that will fund and equip a mobile crisis clinician to offer face-to-face, immediate and short-term mental health care as well as treatment referral services for substance abuse and mental health crises in the community. This provides the department with a unique opportunity to bring the counseling office to the client rather than relying on a client's ability to independently obtain services at locations that may not be easily accessible due to their circumstances.
